



PASTOR'S MUSINGS

Advent Greetings to you all,

On Sunday morning, we launched this year's Advent Season with the message of Hope. Before coming to Worship, I read a quote by Thomas Merton in which he reflected that "on that first Christmas, there was no room at the inn for Joseph and Mary... nor for Jesus in the inn of the world." Merton asked the question: "Is there room for Jesus in the inn of your heart this year?" What would that mean if you did? Would it change the way you go through this season? The way you buy presents this year?

{For all of us, please take some time to read the other messages in this Gargoyle to add to your Advent adventure, experiences, and wisdom.}

During the Worship Service, in my Children's Message, I invited those present to "take a look around at the Advent decorations that have transformed our sanctuary and consider what speaks to you this day that may nurture your spirit during this season. As we go through this month, see what happens as you look at it each week, or if something else jumps out at you. How does it help you to consider how the coming of Jesus into the world can deepen the love in *your heart* this year?"

I also encouraged us all to "be alert" for those moments when we become the messenger or angel in a situation because we have opened our hearts and minds to let the teachings of Jesus transform us. Then, our compassion and choice for love can help dispel a disagreement or power struggle and we may be surprised as we witness the move into a place of peace instead and can give thanks.

Back in 1982, I did a cross-stitch wall hanging of the *Prayer of St Francis* that has influenced my life for decades. It has called to me down through the ages and helped me to expand my mind and heart to welcome him in. May they also offer you some guidance this year.



"Do You Hear What I Hear?"

One of my favorite pieces of Christmas music is the song "Do You Hear What I Hear?" It's not an old chestnut like "O Tannenbaum" (1824) or "Good King Wenceslas" (1853); it was written in 1962 by Noël Regney and Gloria Shayne as a plea for peace during the Cuban Missile crisis.

Each aspect of the song touches me deeply. The lyrics, the meter of the poem, the use of the imagery, and the lovely melody are beautiful. It makes my heart swell each time I hear it. And, although it is not Biblically correct (Herod was not a nice king), the beauty of the song itself brings hope and light into the darkest corners of despair. It asks if we are listening for, hearing, and seeing all that is good in this world, given to us through the birth of the Christ child.

This Advent season, I hope we pause to listen, hear, see, and know that God's love is with us through all the challenges and changes we face every day. I hope that we seek and find, God in the face of a little baby born to bring us goodness and light.

STEWARDSHIP



While the 2022 Stewardship Campaign may have officially concluded, we'd like to think that its theme of "Rooted in Love" continues. We hope that the visuals of the rooted and growing plant has provided a perspective on the importance of and the appreciation for your continued support of Groton Congregational Church and its ministries.

If you haven't yet taken a plant home, there are more in Dutton Hall – please take one or two or three... While there, we hope that you can sit a bit and work on a puzzle. The time is often contemplative and perhaps there will be someone else there, also working on the puzzle, to engage in conversation – or just to enjoy the physical presence of another person.

It's never too late to submit a pledge card! Additional cards are located in Dutton Hall and can also be obtained from the church office. Please let us know if you did not receive a letter and we will make sure that you get one. Pledging allows you to make intentional decisions about your financial giving and in doing so, you make a conscious choice that reflects your faith and values.

There are many ways to fulfill your pledge: you can bring it on Sundays to be collected during church service; perhaps you live nearby and while taking a walk, you can place it in the door slot; you can mail it in. You can even set up direct deposit – see Bill Blaisdell or James Kerrigan for details.

During 2022, we're going to promote what's been called "5 for 5." This is how it works: there are four months during the year where there is a fifth Sunday (January 30, May 29, July 31 and October 30). We are asking that on those Sundays, if you are able, to put in an extra \$5 (or any amount) in the collection plate. Thanks to Jill Martin for sharing the idea of "5 for 5."

TREASURER'S MOMENT





A Treasurer's Message Written on the First Sunday of Advent

The Stewardship Committee had a well organized campaign that ended with a very nice luncheon. One Sunday, as Cathy Johnson was showing us the progress of her nasturtium plant

to demonstrate the promise contained in the little seed from which it germinated, I was reminded of a time when my father was involved with a stewardship campaign in this very congregation. The plant he referenced at the time was a turnip and something about how an extremely successful stewardship chairman was described as someone who could squeeze blood from a turnip. I was so young then that he had to explain to me that it was only a saying. The imagery of plants grown from a tiny seed lends itself better to a positive stewardship message that pictures of getting blood from a turnip or from a stone.

Today is the First Sunday of Advent. James Kerrigan and I lit the candle of Hope. In the sense of Advent Hope is far more than a *wish*, it is the *expectation* of the arrival of Jesus as foretold by the prophets and, indeed, the Hope candle is sometimes called the Prophecy candle.

To switch to a less theological theme, but to something that kind of parallels the above: As acting treasurer I always wish for a higher level of donations to make my job easier and less stressful, but I have learned that one can have the expectation that the members and friends of Groton Congregational Church come through with sufficient support.

In order to fulfill that expectation please remember that our annual budget meeting is in January. The Board of Trustees must develop a budget to present at that meeting and they will need me, the staff, and committees to provide budget requests in time to go into a report to be made available by the second week in January. The most important part for the treasurer is to be able to make a projection of income with some confidence. I would urge everyone in the congregation who is planning to pledge for 2022 to do so as soon as possible. Also, in order to keep us from having to pull funds out of our investments please keep your pledges current. It was necessary at one point this past year to draw \$5,000 from our investments. A second time we came very close to making another draw down, but that was avoided because some pledges were brought up to date.

At the moment we have reached about 75% of the level of last year's pledges. In very rough round numbers our budget has been around \$150,000. Pledges are about \$100,000. Income from investments and plate collections cover much of the rest, but also we avoid depleting our endowment only when committees do not spend their budget, or we go without a CE director, or, as now, a number of our members volunteer to clean the building instead of paying a janitorial service. Not infrequently a member will also buy various supplies and not ask to be reimbursed. It is clear that we do have a very tight budget and need everyone of support as they are able. On the other hand we are blessed with angels among us.

It is common to take a few more weeks to reach, and hopefully surpass, the level of pledges from the previous year – so my hopeful expectations for the financial support by congregation are not diminished.



I wish you enough pain so that the smallest joys in life appear much bigger.


I wish you enough gain to satisfy your wanting.

Faith Brings Hope That No Pandemic Can Quench by John Dorhauer | published on Nov 26, 2021 In his 2021 Advent letter to the church, United Church of Christ

General Minister and President John C. Dorhauer acknowledges the world's second COVID Christmas.

Dear Friends in Christ, The world has changed.

Familiar patterns in life, in worship and in work have been closeted in order to secure the safety and health of ourselves, our loved ones, our classmates and colleagues.



New patterns will arrive, some of which we will welcome, some of which we will not.

Grief upon grief has been visited upon us all. Hope and joy are harder to locate these days; while virulence and distrust, anger and vitriol appear around every corner.

In his Advent hymn "Night of Silence", Marty Haugen has composed these lyrics:

Cold are the people, winter of life.

We tremble in shadows this cold endless night.

Frozen in the snow lie roses sleeping.

Flowers that will echo the sunrise.

Fire of hope is our only warmth.

Weary, its flame will be dying soon.

His poetic lyrics capture our collective ennui. He names it: cold are the people. Frozen in the snow lie roses sleeping, flowers that will echo the sunrise. With every aching bone in our body we want this winter to come to an end and for the shadows of this cold, endless night we have been living through to accede to the light of a new sun.

The final verse of this beautiful hymn of Marty's speaks again of the hope faith engenders from the shadowed valleys we have been navigating with deepening depths of despair. He gives voice to our longing for new light – a light we once knew when love was incarnated in Jesus:

Spirit among us, shine like the star
Your light that guides shepherds and kings from afar
Shimmer in the sky so empty, lonely
Rising in the warmth of your Son's love
Star unknowing of night and day
Spirit we wait for your Loving Son.

Spirit, we wait.

We have waited long.

Month after long, lonely month.

We wait for your Loving Son.

"Come, O Come, Emmanuel," we sing.

O come, thou Dayspring from on high, and cheer us by thine advent here.

Disperse the gloomy clouds of night, and death's dark shadows put to flight.

We need Thee, O we need Thee. Every hour we need Thee.

From the shadowed valleys we cry our "Emmanuel, come!" — waiting for the dayspring to cheer us, knowing that frozen in the snow lies roses sleeping.

This is our hope. No pandemic can quench the flickering flames of faith deep within us.

We await again the dawning of another rising son. Come, o come – our Emmanuel.


