For those of us who are coming into your midst, though, we are coming from different roots in one respect; but we are interweaving our stories with yours knowing that we have all consciously chosen "to root ourselves in the love of God and Jesus" and his choices to be the servant of God's love who could lead us all into the ways of salvation. As we say each Sunday, "No matter who you are or where you are on life's journey, you are welcome here." Let us continue to celebrate and be grateful for the freedom we have to share of who we are and be freed from those who would try to shape us into their image of "who we should be" instead of who God created us to be. Since we know of this precious gift and call from God to us – let us give thanks for this free gift as we choose to stand in our relationship with God and each other and BE those who want to invite others into this freedom and love.

I stated that I was curious as to what dreams you folks are having as we go into this fall and next year, and what visions you are sensing for the future of our church.



### Missions Message





We are seeking donations for the silent auction. Some suggestions are—gift cards and themed gift baskets.



### Voting Your Values-It's a Matter of Faith!

Whenever you did one of these things for someone overlooked or ignored, you did it for me.  $\sim$  Matthew 25:40

Extreme weather events keep making headlines. Pakistan, Puerto Rico and Florida are just a few more recent examples of the devastating impact of the climate crisis, particularly on vulnerable communities. All around the globe, climate emergencies are impacting those who can least protect themselves against a changing climate and who have done the least to create the crisis.



The climate crisis fuels so much injustice. Corporate interests site sacrifice zones in black and brown neighborhoods. Droughts and superstorms set climate migration and political instability in motion. Wildfires destroy lives and livelihoods. Carbon pollution from burning fossil fuels increases the rate of asthma, cancer, and heart disease, especially in vulnerable communities. Habitat loss accelerates the risk that novel viruses like Covid 19 will spread from wildlife reservoirs to the human population threatening lives and causing economic volatility. Sooner or later, every justice issue intersects with the disruption that arises from the climate emergency.

As people of faith, we are called to see Christ in those too often ignored or disregarded. How we live out our faith matters. Voting is one of the ways that we can respond to the crisis and work to create a just world for all.

That is why we hope you will take a moment to explore the Faith Matters Voting Challenge and these two brief videos on the intersection of faith and voting from the Rev. Our vote matters, not just in the big national election years, but in all the local and state elections in between, because politicians pay attention to the priorities of people who vote.

Non-voters can send emails, write letters to the editor, go to protests, and put out campaign signs, but if they don't vote their priorities, they don't make it onto politicians' radar. To get elected, candidates use the public record to contact the people who actually show up and vote. Voters' priorities are the ones that matter to candidates, and the candidates who win are the ones who will end up implementing legislation.

There are not nearly enough voters in this country for whom the climate crisis is a priority. That is why the Environmental Ministries Team has partnered with the Environmental Voter Project (EVP) to promote the SNEUCC Creation Care Voter Pledge. The Environmental Voter Project is a non-partisan, nonprofit organization whose mission is to get more environmental supporters to vote in every election. The Environmental Voter Project does not endorse candidates or tell people how to vote. They follow up with each pledger, reminding them to vote in each of their upcoming elections - local, state, and national - because reminding someone of their pledge to vote can dramatically increase that person's likelihood of voting.

The SNEUCC Environmental Ministries Team also developed resources to mobilize your congregation as part of the Faith Matters Voting Challenge. You can download the brochure here.

Persuading your congregation that voting is a matter of faith and mobilizing them to take the Creation Care Voter Pledge is the first step. But in the weeks and months and years ahead, we have more to do. We've got to get the word out to our communities and wider networks. You can even involve your children and youth in the effort by joining the national UCC Climate Hope Cards Art Contest which runs from October 4th to November 29th. Join the Faith Matters Voting Challenge and explore ways that you can make the connection between faith and voting to elect legislators from all political perspectives at all levels who will act to reverse the climate crisis. Together we can make the climate crisis a priority, and only when it is a priority to voters will it become a priority to legislators. Every election matters.

### Karlsrhue

In a meeting yesterday, I was invited to share about something that had recently brought me joy.

Although by this time I had been back from my trip to Karlsruhe, Germany, to attend the World Council of Churches gathering by more than a month, I nonetheless immediately thought of something that happened every day while we were there.

At 8:30 every morning, 10 days in a row, thousands of religious leaders from around the world would gather in the cool morning air of an outdoor amphitheater and spend an hour in worship with one another.

I would sit transformed by the experience – that is, when I wasn't moved to dance, which, believe it or not, happened often.

Color was one of the first things that struck me about what was different about this worship. Skin tones of every hue and shade, from the darkest brown and black to the palest white and everything in between would take the stage and sing, pray, preach or dance. And their clothes – the collective coats of many colors they were, bright fabrics of every make and shade, each bearing something unique to their culture and context.

After color was sound. Oh, my, the sounds! Languages and dialects and accents from countries and cultures and communities all over the globe. No one translated anything, each sound was allowed to stand on its own. Intonation and facial expression and body language sometimes helped to enhance the meaning of words you did not recognize, but often you just let the words, though incomprehensible, stand on their own as offerings of love and praise to the God who heard them all and knew, even if I did not.

But the sound that really made the experience unlike any other I had ever had the pleasure of experiencing was the music. Guitars and pianos and drums and flutes and tambourines and maracas and more accompanying a choir that must have spent months preparing. The beats and rhythms of the music reflected something inherently known to each culture, often lifting us up out of chairs with the shuffling of our feet or the clapping of our hands or the grasping of our neighbor and with them dancing. Again, each song was also offered in its native tongue. Literal meaning gave way to imaginative musings about what God was hearing and what we were expressing.

I would arrive early every morning, discovering that for the hour or so before worship the choir and musicians would rehearse. So, for the better part of two hours I would be transported into what had to be something very akin to the throne-room of God Herself.

And while I soaked it all in, I knew that this was something I would experience rarely. I would not be given too many chances in a lifetime to worship authentically and without any appropriation in the language and rhythm and movement of this many peoples from that many places. It was, at the age of 61, a first such moment for me. I asked myself as I sat there under what circumstances this would happen again. I was hard-pressed to find an answer. I took it all in for what it was – a Pentecost moment I was privileged to have unfold for me over two weeks in Germany; a glimpse of something so sacred, so divine, so rare – a beloved community where borders and boundaries evaporated and people found common joy in the praise of their maker. I will call it a foretaste, a small sample of what God knows is possible – the planting of seeds that with love can blossom into the peace we all long for on this, our journey Into the Mystic.
