
We now go into the new year of 2023 with a stronger sense of who we are as a congregation and the invitation that is here for us as we continue the ministry of Jesus with compassion, forgiveness, perseverance, and love. We are still facing the challenges of Covid and other viruses, so perseverance seemed like an important word to include there.

We will continue our many offerings through January as usual with the Bible Studies on Monday mornings and our other committee activities. I know the weather may be a roller coaster ride, but I look forward to being with you in new ways during these winter months. Stay tuned.

At the last leaders' meeting, we discussed setting up a Vision Gathering on Jan 29 after church with a soups and breads luncheon.

Sue Blaisdell and I have talked about how to include the biblical symbolism and message of "the remnant" as described in several of the Old Testament stories after the Exodus. That became a very significant symbol for me to use with congregations who had gone through a split in the church over how to "be" the church, especially if a pastor left with hard feelings or as we are experiencing now- with the impact of Covid and the change in our culture with sports activities and work requirements - but also because of what people can do on Sunday mornings knowing they can watch our services at another time.

There is a strong remnant here at GCC who loves being together on Sunday mornings and wouldn't chose any other place to be. The biblical image of the remnant is a very significant one - because it is the people who have learned that God is in their midst and blessing them to carry forward the messages and traditions and liturgies for future generations. Some thought it meant they were the "chosen ones", thinking they'd have special blessings, which in some ways they did. But they also had the "Calling" to be the bearers of God's light into the world with the message of love and grace, peace and hope so that future generations could receive the Word and all could find a way to choose love and not fear as they lived and cared for one another. As John tried to explain in his Gospel, Jesus "became flesh and lived among us," to learn the realities of being human in the presence of other humans. (Con't pg. 3)

#### **Every Saint a Past, Every Sinner a Future**

On a bit of a lark, I got to hear Dan Tyminski in concert last night. I was just browsing the interwebs when I saw it – Dan was coming to the Kent State concert hall tomorrow and I got nothing on the calendar. I texted Mimi and she said "let's do it!"

So I bought the tickets, and last night Mimi and I climbed into the car, drove the one hour to Akron where we enjoyed a most lovely evening with some of the most delightful music we have heard in some time.

Now, if you don't know Dan Tyminski, he's the lead guitarist and background vocalist for Alison Kraus' backing band, Union Station. He's recorded his own music, but rarely has attracted much of a following for that. His biggest hit was recorded with Swedish DJ Avicii, an electric dance music artist of some renown. However, if, like me, you are a fan of the Coen Brothers' movie O Brother, Where Art Thou then you will recognize, if not his face, then his voice. He dubbed the vocals to the song "Man of Constant Sorrow" for George Clooney. And yes, he closed the concert with that song last night.

Born in rural Vermont, Dan is quite known amongst bluegrass fans. Mimi and I happen to lovers of roots music. Getting a chance to spend an idle evening listening to Dan was a treat: a nice surprise on what would have otherwise been a quiet evening watching Jeopardy and then whatever PBS was showing.

The concert was a little unusual in that Dan played without his band. He told us he felt naked on the stage with them, and really missed having the banjo there with him. But this stripped down version of Dan was magical and gave him a chance to play music he had written and recorded but hadn't sung in years. He brought a young dobro player with him, and the two of them riffed unrehearsed for a solid two hours. Their musicianship, showmanship, and pure raw talent was utterly delightful.

But on to the topic at hand and the reason why I am telling you all of this in this podcast about spiritual centering. Early in the set, he sang a song Huckelberry that he recorded early in his career. I had never heard the song. It is a melancholic rehearsal of the ravages of a life lived on rocky pathways, confessing times of hard living made by bad choices. In the refrain, there is a line that stopped me for a couple heartbeats and sent me reflecting on how good songwriting can touch the soul and heal deep wounds.

The line was this: every saint has a past, and every sinner a future.

Dang.

14 years of theological training and 33 years practicing ministry and preaching and I never could write a line as profound and impactful as that.

In a world and within a Christianity that have grown far too judgmental and too quick to condemn, where hatred and superior, self-righteous arrogance displace grace, forgiveness, compassion, and understanding Dan writes a line that reminds us never to cast the first stone,

We are none of us without sin and all of us within the loving embrace of a God with no limit for forgiveness. And how often shall I forgive my enemy? Seventy-times seven times.

Every saint has a past, and every sinner a future.

Walk with grace my friends on this, our journey Into the Mystic.

#### Write A Compelling Annual Report

**Annual Reports** 

What story does your annual report tell? I read the annual report of a congregation in preparation for meeting with a church council. The pastor's report started off with a comment about a picture being worth a thousand words. I looked through the 50-page report – not a picture to be found. Instead, every board, committee, ministry, and seemingly 5th Sunday usher wrote up a few paragraphs about what they did in sleep inducing prose.

The congregation missed the opportunity to tell a compelling story.

If this sounds like your congregation, try creating a common story about impact of your ministry.

Instead of collecting a few paragraphs from each committee on what they did, ask them to share 1-3 pictures of the past year and to discuss as team these questions:

When did we see our congregation at its best?

What impact do we make in people's lives?

Where do we find a growing edge or challenge in our ministry?

As a council, reflect on what you hear from your committees to identity shared themes. Based on this discussion, write up the story of your last year as a congregation. Try to speak to the difference your congregation makes in people's lives, name goals for the coming year, and thank 1-3 crucial volunteers. Once the council agrees on a narrative for the year, pick out some of the best photos to intersperse with the text.

Alternatively, hold a council conversation that reflects on the mission statement of the congregation. Name the ways you lived out the mission statement in the last year. Think of what you might try in the coming year. Use this conversation to write up a short reflection for the whole congregation (and don't forget to include some pictures from throughout the year).

Annual reports produced by these processes will tell a common story of why the congregation mattered, how people engaged the ministry, and what impact it made in the community. When we tell a common story, we can inspire people to give (and help make them feel good about the gifts already given).

You will have much more material from committees – comments and photos – than you can use in the annual report. Use the best of these "scraps" to write up quarterly or monthly notes on the impact of your congregation, perhaps sent out with updates on donations or as part of your newsletter.

Overall, move from a laundry list of committee reports to a compelling narrative (with pictures) of your ministry.
