
Greetings to you all,

America Still Prays

A national poll about prayer was done in honor of the National Day of Prayer, celebrated this year on May 4. I was surprised and heartened by its findings. Yes, most Americans do pray in some way. According to the poll:

"... 85% say they engage in a spiritual practice to connect with a higher power, whether prayer, meditation, mindfulness, reciting affirmations or spiritually based yoga. Prayer, at 61%, is the most common of the five practices, with 39% of Americans saying they practiced meditation and 38% practicing mindfulness."



Of those who pray, 87% reported that they received an answer within the past 12 months.

The finding that most surprised me was that although 61% of Americans pray, more people pray in their cars than in their places of worship!

So if you pray in your car, don't feel uncomfortable about it. You are not alone.

And your practice conforms well with Matthew 6:6, which says:

"But when you pray, go into your room and shut the door and pray to your Father who is in secret; and your Father who sees in secret will reward you."

Any place you chose to pray is a fine and appropriate place for praying.



Jesus Prays for His Disciples

After Jesus had spoken these words, he looked up to heaven and said, 'Father, the hour has come; glorify your Son so that the Son may glorify you, since you have given him authority over all people, to give eternal life to all whom you have given him. And this is eternal life, that they may know you, the only true God, and Jesus Christ whom you have sent. I glorified you on earth by finishing the work that you gave me to do. So now, Father, glorify me in your own presence with the glory that I had in your presence before the world existed.

'I have made your name known to those whom you gave me from the world. They were yours, and you gave them to me, and they have kept your word. Now they know that everything you have given me is from you; for the words that you gave to me I have given to them, and they have received them and know in truth that I came from you; and they have believed that you sent me. I am asking on their behalf; I am not asking on behalf of the world, but on behalf of those whom you gave me, because they are yours. All mine are yours, and yours are mine; and I have been glorified in them. And now I am no longer in the world, but they are in the world, and I am coming to you. Holy Father, protect them in your name that you have given me, so that they may be one, as we are one.

Reflection: Love IS Your Work

This scripture is jam-packed with different themes one could explore, but the tentacle that jumped out at me with this week's reading was that of bringing God glory through my work. Now it's easy to jump to the assumption that a pastor could bring glory to God by serving faithfully in that role, but what about others? This passage clearly states, " I have brought you glory on earth by finishing the work you gave me to do." That says nothing about pastors...it refers to ALL of us...and it says nothing about the type of work or even that it means "paid" work.

Our "work" in the world is whatever God has called us to be. We may be parents, or trash collectors, or teachers, or baggers at the grocery store, or lawn rakers, or doctors, or soup kitchen volunteers...the "title" of what we do is not what's important to God, but rather the spirit with which we do it.

As you go about your daily life and work, does the way you move through the world glorify God? Are you the one offering a friendly smile to one who seems a little discouraged, or a helping hand whenever you see a need? Do you take the time to look into the eyes of a cashier or a customer, depending what side of the register you are on, and really see and greet the person before you? As we walk through each day there are a multitude of ways we can bring hope and light to others.

Love IS Your Work-continued

The Sanskrit word "namaste" offers us a beautiful description of seeing one another fully. When one utters this word, often while bowing toward another with hands together as if in prayer, one is actually saying, "The God in me greets the God in you." And this is our work.

Taking this even further, perhaps God was not talking about "work" as we think of it, in this passage. Perhaps, this scripture is meant to speak of our eternal work… our calling to be people of faith. Perhaps our work is to love one another as Christ loved us. Can it really be that simple? I think it can...and I think it is. I have a dear friend who is like a brother to me, who has a unique ministry: he

owns a liquor store. Yes, a liquor store. And why do I call it a ministry? Because it is. He hires folks who might struggle to get employment anywhere else and then helps them to get a firmer foundation under their feet. He has been known to help some of his patrons to get help when their drinking has become excessive. He has driven customers home who should not be behind the wheel. He has visited clients in the hospital. Can you think of a better way of glorifying God?

Often, we are tempted to blame our circumstances for our attitudes or our actions, but no matter what, God is present right there alongside us and still calling us to serve. All of us can find a way to be kind...and even to be loving...as we go about our daily lives. This is our Christian "work" and this is the work that glorifies God.

Commencement

This is a season in which students who have been studying for years, who have been preparing themselves for something coming, end their season of preparation and set out to make a life. This is the season of their new beginnings.

As I write this, I am one day away from speaking at the commencement ceremony for the UCC related Elmhurst University. My colleagues Traci Blackmon and Karen Georgia Thompson are likewise speaking to graduates at Spellman College and Heidelberg College respectively. In

this time of new beginnings, when graduates are called upon to commence – to start, to begin – there is a responsibility for leaders like myself and Traci and Karen Georgia to speak a word that inspires graduates to use their time in preparation to launch a lifetime of commitments to the common good.

This is the moment of which Robert Frost wrote when he penned his poem "The Road Less Taken," using the convergence of two roads diverging in a yellow wood as a metaphor for that moment when we must decide which pathway we will spend our days walking.

Almost their entire educational career was spent not only learning new and important concepts, but learning how to learn those new and important concepts in an environment neither they nor their professors had any idea how to navigate. They invented a whole new way of getting an education and have come out the other side of it maybe wounded, maybe scarred, but fully educated, fully prepared to begin, and deeply aware of their capacity to not only survive trauma but thrive through it. That may be their most important learning as well as their most significant contribution to their future success in life.

And so to the graduating class of 2023 we all say Commence!

Begin!

Choose your path and start your life.

We await your wisdom.

We covet your contributions.

We desire your passion and energy and enthusiasm and hope.

The world is in want of what you have been given in terms of ability, talent, vision, and preparation. Whatever journey you take, may it enrich the communities in which you dwell and grant you the joy of labors loved and lives changed. The world itself is gratified by your commitments and celebrates your calling.
