
Greetings to you on this beautiful autumn day.

Kindness and Rocks?



With all the tragedy and uncertainty in the world today it is easy to get disheartened and discouraged wondering what our role in all of it is, how can we individually and collectively make a difference? We may not be able to stop war and hatred across the globe, but we all have in our power the ability to share and spread a bit of kindness.

When you Google "Kindness in the Bible" over 40 verses are referenced.

My all time favorite is Micah 6:8: "He has told you, O man, what is good; and what does the LORD require of you but to do justice, and to love kindness, and to walk humbly with your God?" Justice, Kindness and Humility; these ach of us has the ability to spread kindness in our everyday life

What Really IS Intergenerational Worship?

More and more congregations are reaching out to <u>the Faith Formation Team</u> with questions about and to request assistance with intergenerational worship. Word is getting out about the tangible benefits of corporate worship with all ages present:

• Intergenerational worship brings together the *whole* Body of Christ.

• The sounds of children remind the congregation that their church is vital and alive.

• Adult worshippers can learn from the trusting and open nature of children that

Jesus told us are qualities of the kin-dom of heaven. [Luke 18:15-17].

• Young worshippers learn through observation and practice during corporate worship.

• Adults can find new ways to praise God, using all five senses, by worshipping with all ages. Intergenerational worship solves the problem of not being able to recruit enough adult volunteers for children's faith formation programming, *and* <u>studies show</u> that the resulting growth in faith and commitment to being a part of a faith community into adulthood are vastly more effective than the outcomes from the Sunday School model.

Yet many congregations are wary of trying worship with all ages for the entire hour. This is because the concept of effective intergenerational worship is often misunderstood. Intergenerational worship is not "Children's Sunday" every week. Intergenerational worship is not a dumbing down of worship for the youngest people present. And intergenerational worship is not all balloons and children's performances.

So what do we mean by "intergenerational worship"? Here are some definitions of current commonly used terms:

- Intergenerational worship: Three or more generations worshipping and interacting with each other in the same space.
- Multi-generational worship: Multiple generations in the same building/space, worshipping and interacting with their own generations/peer groups.

• Child-friendly worship: Worship that provides materials for children (visuals, items to hold, art supplies, etc.) that help them to hear, understand, and participate fully in worship.

<u>Messy Church</u>: a program that is separate from a congregation's weekly service of worship, for all ages, serving as a mission to local families. Congregations that use this term, must register through

Messy Church USA, as the name and logo are registered trademarks.

Messy Church model: a Christ-focused gathering for all ages that includes child-friendly activities for families, simple and active worship styles, singing accessible songs, and a shared meal.

What Really IS Intergenerational Worship

Another important definition to add is what it means to be intentionally intergenerational:

incorporating as many of the five senses as possible, bringing one's whole self to praising God;

• welcoming the developmentally appropriate sounds from children that God recognizes as praise. A congregation provides expectations that those who need to make louder noises (crying, coughing, loud speaking, etc.) have a place to go outside of the sanctuary and are always welcome to return;

• inviting all to sing, pray, and hear/see the Good News, stretching themselves in understanding even if they are not yet developmentally ready to comprehend everything they see and hear; and inviting participation from all ages, offering whatever they are willing and able to give. (All are invited; any may opt out.)

Intergenerational worship with the whole Body of Christ is like a family dinner table conversation — available to all ages, where all are welcome; where the youngest ones present do not need to understand all of the words, as this creates neural pathways for understanding when they are older. (See the work of <u>Karen-Marie Yust</u>.)

Each generation brings its own abilities, needs, and gifts [I Corinthians 12:14]. Intergenerational worship welcomes them all — the energetic, the feeble, the full-bodied, the differently-abled, the new learners, and the seasoned wise ones. Our worshipping community can only worship God fully when it provides the space and opportunity for all to do so together.

If We Take Sides

How beautiful on the mountains are the feet of those who bring good news, who proclaim peace Isaiah 52:7

I write this shortly after Hamas launched their deadliest assault on Israel and the IDF responded with airstrikes; now thousands are dead on both sides. Over one hundred and fifty Israeli civilians, of all ages, are hostages. At least a thousand Palestinian children are dead. The suffering is unimaginable.

I am an outsider to this conflict, but it seems to me that until shared suffering inspires an understanding of the other's pain and trauma, instead of driving more violence toward each other, peace will seem like a pipe dream.

Thich Nhat Hahn, who has stood between two warring factions, said, "To reconcile conflicting parties, we must have the ability to understand the suffering of both sides. If we take sides, it is impossible to do the work of reconciliation. And humans want to take sides. That is why the situation gets worse and worse.

"Are there people who are still available to both sides? They need not do much. They need do only one thing: Go to one side and tell all about the suffering endured by the other side and go to the other side and tell all about the suffering endured by this side. This is our chance for peace."

In recent decades, small groups of Israelis and Palestinians found a way to peaceful reconciliation through shared tears. From what I understand, it takes a deep, resolute commitment to listening with compassion and without reacting. Multiplying such experiences might be the surest way to break the cycle of violence and build lasting peace in the region.

And not only there. Until we all hear the suffering of "the other," how can we hope to hear peace proclaimed from the Holy Land to our own backyards?




