

In September I will begin leading another Bible study, which will focus on the Acts of the Apostles, building on the sermon series. Dates and time to come later.

I continue to normally be in the church office on Mondays from 10am to 2pm, and sometimes on other days as well. I pray that as you experience that rest and relaxation of the summer season, that you will rest in God as well, and continue to grow spiritually in your lives as Christians.

### Wherever you are, God is with you

Ah the joys of summer. Perhaps you are travelling on vacation. Perhaps you are staying at home. July is often a time to break away from the normal day to day routine even if for only a moment. I think that we are trained from our school days as children.



June is a transition. Ending of one period and anticipation of the next. Finishing your school year and waiting for summer break. August is about the end of summer with the impending school year around the corner. July is the month of freedom. A sentiment that is only reinforced by the July 4<sup>th</sup> holiday at the beginning of the month.

I often find myself feeling a stronger presence of God out in the world, exploring his creation compared to when I am sitting in church. It doesn't matter if you are sitting in Church, out in nature, with a large group, or sitting alone in the dark. God is with you.

For those of you staying in our community and going to church on Sundays do not despair if there are fewer people present. For those of you who are travelling or just avoiding the heat know that God is present with wherever you are.


