In September there will be another Bible study or topic study. I haven't decided what the topic will be yet, or the time, although it will probably be a daytime study. I plan to alternate between daytime and evening studies, to hopefully reach as many people in the congregation who want to come as possible. Stay tuned for more information on that soon.

The following provides the procedure for publicizing church events and information with the community on social media.

- The different outlets that are currently used by Groton Congregational are Facebook, Instagram, NextDoor and Patch.
- Events and information posted to Facebook are automatically posted to Instagram.
- The only recurring post from the church (posted without a specific request) is a weekly graphic inviting people to worship. This is posted on Facebook, Instagram and NextDoor.
- Simply because an event is on the church/office calendar does not mean it will automatically be posted to social media. To have an event posted, submit a request to the office. Using the "Publicity Request" (included here) is required as well as helpful in the development of the publicity. You can collaborate with the secretary on all aspects of the ad, including if you would like an email blast prepared and sent, a poster or flyer created. Nothing will be posted until the format has been reviewed and agreed upon.
- Facebook, Instagram, and NextDoor: smaller graphic posts are best because post uploads are size dependent. Too large a graphic makes the post difficult to read and could be rejected by the media platform.
- (Groton) Patch is best for events or specific articles. This media outlet is intended to be used as a hub for local news and information relevant to the residents of Groton.
- The New London Day charges for different types of advertising. They require the ad copy be submitted to them a minimum of 4 weeks prior to the event, and unless it is a paid ad, do not place priority on printing or posting it online.
- All events at the church that do not involve the use of the sanctuary require the Trustees' approval
  of the event and the specifics of the publicity prior to submitting it to the office. Exceptions to this
  are advertising that the Deacons are responsible for such as Easter and Christmas and other
  events requiring the use of the sanctuary. Once the Trustees or Deacons have approved the use

of the building and/or sanctuary for an event, they will inform the office, and advertising can then be requested.

- To ensure quality and accuracy, all posts must be reviewed and approved by all relevant parties prior to publication. As with most things, earlier submissions are strongly encouraged, the sooner a post is received, the smoother and more efficient the review and approval process will be.
- For information on upcoming deadlines for various publications, refer to the card posted in various locations within the church, including the main bulletin board.

#### They are:

- Bulletin/Sunday Order of Service: Tuesday by 2:00 pm
- Gargoyle Articles: 4<sup>th</sup> Tuesday of the month
- Publicity: one month prior to the event.

To begin the process for any of the preceding procedure, start with an email to the office **once approval** for the event has been given by the Trustees or Deacons.

# **Faith in Action and Community**

We all want our church family to participate in the important work of inviting people to church and sharing our Christian love with them. This doesn't always happen automatically — it takes intentional effort.



Inviting friends isn't just about filling seats but about sharing the love of Jesus and building a stronger Christian community. For most people it's easier to welcome people to church once they arrive, rather than going out of our way to invite someone yourself. It can feel pretty intimidating to directly encourage people to attend or visit church.

Inviting someone to church is a powerful way to share God's love and grow our community. A personal invitation is perhaps the best way to invite someone to church because there's an existing connection for the invitee. There is a comfort level attending a new church when they already know someone there. It can help take away the anxiety of having to navigate around on their own, or the fear of sitting by themselves. Plus, when they visit church because of a personal invitation from someone they know, they already have a point person to answer any questions they may have.

Naturally, the more you invite people, the easier it will become. Even if someone doesn't accept your invitation right away, celebrate the fact that you stepped out in faith, did what God tells us to do, and extended that first invitation. Every effort counts. Don't get discouraged if someone turns down your invitation the first time. You never know how God could be working in their heart, and one day, they might just say yes!

This month we need half gallons of apple juice and other juices. We also need large black garbage bags. We always need fruit.

As a thank you note, here is one of our recipes. It takes advantage of the local fresh squash that is now at the grocery stores. We served it as a side dish on Saturday, July 19, 2025.

## **Squash Casserole**

#### Ingredients:

6 small yellow squash, thinly sliced (small zucchini would work, too.)

½ cup sour cream

2 large eggs, room temperature

2-3 tablespoons minced onions

½ teaspoon salt

¼ teaspoon black pepper

2 cloves finely minced garlic (or 1 tsp. garlic powder)

1-1/2 cup grated sharp cheddar

# Topping:

34 cup Italian breadcrumbs (or panko bread crumbs)

3 tablespoon butter, melted

1 tablespoon Parmesan cheese

1 tablespoon fresh chopped parsley (optional)

#### **Directions:**

Preheat the oven to 350 F.

Lightly butter a 2-quart casserole dish or 9x13 inch baking pan.

Wash and thinly slice the squash. Place the slices into a large mixing bowl.

In a medium mixing bowl, combine the sour cream, eggs, onions. garlic (or garlic powder), salt, and pepper. Fold in the grated cheddar cheese.

Pour over the sliced squash. Mix to combine. Transfer the squash and cheese mixture into the prepared baking dish


# **Crunchy Topping**

Mix the bread crumbs and melted butter. Sprinkle the topping mixture evenly on the casserole.

Sprinkle with the Parmesan cheese.

Crushed potato chips may be substituted for crumbs for a gluten -free casserole.

Bake 30-40 minutes until the top is light brown, and the cheese is bubbly. Let rest a few minutes before serving. This makes about 10 servings.




