We are coming upon that time of year where you may be asked to serve on a board or committee (or continue to do so) here at Groton Congregational. It is these boards and committees that collectively


operate our church and guide us to be the people that God has called us to be. While our numbers may be small, there is always something each of us can do to work towards that call.

Comfortable or Change

What to do? Remain comfortable or choose change...what to do? I am sharing the first two paragraphs in chapter one from a novel written by Richard Paul Evans. The name – The Mistletoe Secret.

"Whether we admit it or not, most of us live our lives on autopilot. We wake at the same hour, go to the same place of work or worship, talk to the same people, eat at the same restaurants, even watch the same TV shows. I'm not criticizing this. Habit is stability and stability is vital to survival. There's a reason farmers don't change crops midseason. When wisdom does not require change, it is wisdom not to change.

"But sometimes the evolving terrain of life requires us to evolve with it. When those times come, we usually find ourselves quivering on the precipice of change as long as we can, because no one wants to dive headlong into the ravine of uncertainty. No one. Only when the pain of being becomes too much do we close our eyes and leap."

Pause. Pause. And re-read. Pause (again)

The word stopping me and causing me to reflect on these two paragraphs is/was – worship! A single word stops me to reflect.

Worship – every Sunday. Habit. Stability. Do you find a challenged feeling of emptiness when worship is missed on a Sunday? My calendar is thrown off kilter. There is an empty spot. BUT, my focus with respect to worship was evolving around the Advent season, because of the novel title. And this is before I even started to read the third paragraph, let alone the novel.

I had a sense of guilt for my pause or actually self-doubting. Doubting is a useful thing. Challenging? Definitely. And what's fantastic about faith and worshipping each Sunday is the ability to meet the challenges ... the necessary step of going "to the well" for spiritual recharge. So rather than looking at doubting as "the wind in the sails of faith," perhaps think of it as a kind of recharging the spiritual essence within would be better. Everyone should be honest and reflective about doubts, but they shouldn't be content to just hang on to those doubts and never move beyond them. Especially with the approaching of the Advent season.

As God sent to us Jesus, God also blesses us every day with His "love".

Peace to each of you and may you overcome your "doubt" challenges with God's blessings.



In thanks, here is our recipe for:

Apple Crisp

Heat oven to 375 F.

Topping Mixture:

1/2 cup dark brown sugar

1/2 cup white sugar

3/4 cup old fashioned oats; quick oats can be used, but it may yield a slightly different texture

3/4 cup all-purpose flour

1 tsp ground cinnamon

pinch of salt

1/2 cup cold butter, diced into small cubes (one stick)

Apple Mixture

2 pounds tart cooking apples (about six medium apples). If apples are not tart, add one can unsweetened applesauce.

2 Tbsp white sugar

3/4 tsp cinnamon

1 1/2 tsp. lemon juice

Make Apple Mixture:

Pare apples and cut into slices. Add lemon juice to keep apples from discoloring. Mix 2 Tbsp sugar and 3/4 tsp. cinnamon, and add mixture to apples. Taste one slice. If it is too sweet, add unsweetened applesauce. Place apple mixture in buttered 9" x 9" square pan.

Make Topping:

Mix 1/2 c. dark brown sugar, 1/2 c. white sugar, 3/4 cup oats, 3/4 c flour, 1 tsp. cinnamon, and a pinch of salt.

Cut butter into small chunks and add to oatmeal mixture. Use a pastry blender or two knives to cut the butter into the dry mixture. The mixture should resemble small peas.

Put topping over apples and bake 30 to 40 minutes until apples are cooked.

Serve with ice cream or whipped cream.


